

President's Message – The Changing Face of Our Profession

We the People...the theme for the 2008 AIA National Convention in Boston, emphasized the essential nature of the profession to the health, safety and welfare of society. The AIA designed the convention program with the premise that Architects can shape policies, as well as our environment. Two of three Theme Speakers, Millard Fuller (founder of Habitat for Humanity International) and Ambassador Andrew Young (founder of GoodWorks International) offered calls to service from outside of the profession; that Architects can be central to the resolution of critical issues of our times.

Ambassador Young captivated me with his story of shaping policy to incubate diverse business interest while Mayor of Atlanta. He implored the audience to confront discriminatory intolerance rather than politely smile in silence.

Millard Fuller told of his life-mission; hundreds of thousands of affordable homes. He urged us to pick up a hammer and find our own life-mission.

The AIA designed the convention program with the premise that Architects can shape policies, as well as our environment.

I attended a seminar on generational shifts in our profession. It reminded me that we shape and cultivate the profession; nurturing young leaders, celebrating successes, incubating complementary business interests but weeding-out intolerance. The Millenial Generation attendees represented total racial, ethnic and gender diversity; a huge shift from mostly white-male Baby-boomers in this seminar. This revealed to me that everyone in society will one day be able to see themselves in the faces of the coming leadership of our profession.

The year two thousand nine marks the Centennial of AIA Central Pennsylvania Chapter. As we begin our second century, we have done little to preserve the memory of the Architects, Associates and Affiliates that shaped the first century of our Chapter. I urge you to preserve the memory of their practice or service that made a difference in the community, or simply in the life of another person. 

Recently the Central PA Associates were invited to participate in a construction tour of the Hershey Story Museum which is currently under construction in Hershey, PA. The Hershey Story Museum is being built to commemorate the founder of the Hershey Corporation, Milton Hershey. The museum will tell the story of Milton Hershey as well as serve as a caffe with outdoor seating, a souviner shop for visitors,

and a chocolate lab. The chocolate lab will have stations where visitors will be able to make chocolate with a live instructor in the room. The museum is scheduled to be completed at the end of 08'. The tour was led by Craig Campbell, Assoc. AIA, a project manager for LSC Design. A follow up tour of the Hershey Story Museum will be held on October 30, 2008 just before substantial completion. Lecture Series Update



We are thrilled to be able to have an opportunity to hear Toshiko Mori present the work of her firm and appreciate Armstrong's graciously hosting the Fall Lecture again this year.

Spring Lecture - **Tina Manis** presented a lecture entitled "**4 Questions**" on June 5th in York at the Thos. Somerville Building which was built in 1925

by the P.A. & S. Small Co. as a plumbing, heating, & industrial supply warehouse. Tina began her practice TINA MANIS associates in 2000 and has been featured in Architectural Record in an arch2 article focusing on her balance of professional rigor and family commitments. She has an expressed desire to work with marginalized and nonprofit clients as well as finding beauty in things that seemingly have no value. Tina has bold aspirations of creating architecture that tells us something new about ourselves.



"This building accommodates the Township's first professional fire company through the merger of two volunteer companies. The completed station includes the renovation of an existing building, the addition of a new pre-engineered building, a new pedestrian entry, and a new brick house drying and training tower. The completed culturally responsive complex doubled the size of the existing building. It is a beautifully detailed and very utilitarian public building that mostly avoids current clichés and demonstrates civic responsibility."

"An excellent example of a very good building that was created on a reasonably tight budget within all of the constraints presented by this most challenging building type. The three-story block of repetitive classrooms is sited to form a courtyard with the single-story collective spaces that are very nicely handled. The interiors of this project are especially strong with smaller elements and interesting details used to bring the scale of the larger spaces down. It is refreshing to see some carefully controlled interiors in which everything is not covered up. This is an architecture that was created out of the necessities of making a building."



Canstruction® Competition

Creates Success for Project Share and Local Food Banks

These colorful and creative structures included the Capitol building, a suspension bridge, a hot air balloon, an American flag, a covered bridge, an ice cream sundae, Bart Simpson, sheep in a barnyard, a Hershey kiss and bowling pins.

A team of expert professionals in their industries judged and presented awards for the best and brightest design structures at the Canstruction[®] Competition Awards presentation at the C. Ted Lick Wildwood Conference Center on the HACC Campus.

This award was selected by public ballots from over 35,000 community visitors who attended the recent PA Home Show.


On November 13th, our Chapter's
